### **Final Minutes for Public Meeting**

#### CALL TO ORDER AND ROLL CALL

Mr. Easaw called the meeting to order at 8:40 a.m. The following Board members were present: Charles Easaw, Kim Pipersburgh, Rand Rosenbaum, Mike LeHew, and Arthur W. Baker. No Board members were absent.

Also in attendance was Dennis Seavers, Executive Director.

#### CALL TO THE PUBLIC

Mr. Easaw made a call to the public. No members of the public wished to speak at this portion of the meeting.

#### **MINUTES**

Mr. LeHew made a motion to approve the draft minutes from the March 7, 2008 meeting. Mr. Baker seconded the motion, which passed, 5–0.

#### CHANGE TO FINGERPRINT-CLEARANCE-CARD FEE

Mr. Easaw referred Board members to Mr. Seavers's May 7, 2008 memo on the proposed fingerprint-clearance-card fee increase and to the comments submitted by members of the public (see Attachment 1). Mr. Seavers suggested that, based on the public comments, Board members consider the \$4.00 increase rather than the initially proposed \$5.00 increase.

Mr. Rosenbaum asked whether the Board could be targeted for funds sweeps in the budget negotiations. Mr. Seavers said that the Board of Fingerprinting Fund could be swept. Mr. LeHew asked about the possible addition of new programs to the fingerprint-clearance-card system, particularly in-home care providers. Mr. Seavers said that the Board's revenues would increase as the number of people in the card system increased. However, a large increase, such as one would see with the in-home care providers, could affect the Board's fund balance, since the Board would need to make one-time expenditures before the revenues increased in order to prepare for the influx of applicants. Mr. Seavers said that the \$4.00 increase would likely be sufficient for at least a couple of fiscal years, unless there were major changes to the card system. He said he believed that the Board would need to adopt the \$5.00 increase only if multiple increases in the card fee would be a problem for the member agencies or their stakeholders.

Mr. LeHew made a motion to adopt the \$4.00 increase. Mr. Rosenbaum seconded the motion, which passed 4–1 through a roll-call vote, as indicated below.

Mr. Seavers said that he would file the rules with the Secretary of State's Office and that the fee increase would become effective on July 1, 2008.

#### **EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT**

Mr. Seavers referred Board members to his May 7, 2008 memo on legislation (see Attachment 2). He also reported briefly on House Bill 2727, which he explained would create a two-tiered card system. Mr. Seavers said that he would provide a detailed memo about the bill when it cleared the Legislature.

Mr. Seavers referred Board members to his report on the Board's budget performance through the third quarter of fiscal year ("FY") 2008 (see Attachment 3).

Mr. Seavers referred Board members to his report on the Board's strategic-plan performance through the third quarter of FY 2008 (see Attachment 4).

#### **ADJOURNMENT**

Mr. LeHew made a motion to adjourn the meeting, and Ms. Pipersburgh seconded. The motion passed, 5–0. Mr. Easaw adjourned the meeting at 9:08 a.m.

**SUBJECT:** Update on proposed rule for a fee increase



At its February 8, 2008 meeting, the Board decided to propose a rule change to increase its portion of the fingerprint-clearance-card fee from \$3 to \$8 (a \$5 increase). The proposed rule was published on April 4, 2008, in the *Arizona Administrative Register*. From April 4 to May 5, 2008, the Board accepted comments from the public on the proposed rule change. At its May 16, 2008 meeting, the Board will make a final decision on the proposed rule change.

This memo identifies the options available to the Board. Attached are the comments submitted between April 4 and May 5.

#### Correction

In the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking, which was published in the April 4, 2008 edition of the *Arizona Administrative Register*, I incorrectly stated that the cost of a fingerprint clearance card would increase from \$47 to \$55 for employees. The cost would actually increase only from \$47 to \$52 for employees. The notice correctly stated that the cost of a card for volunteers would increase from \$43 to \$48.

#### **Options**

- \$5 increase. The Board could adopt the proposed \$5 fee increase. The Board's portion of the fingerprint-clearance-card fee would increase from \$3 to \$8. The fingerprint clearance card fee would increase from \$47 to \$52 for employees and \$43 to \$48 for volunteers.
- **\$4 increase.** The Board could adopt a \$4 increase instead of the proposed \$5 increase. The Board's portion of the fingerprint-clearance-card fee would increase from \$3 to \$7. The fingerprint-clearance-card fee would increase from \$47 to \$51 for employees and \$43 to \$47 for volunteers. The Board may want to adopt this fee increase based on the comments it received on the proposed rule.
- Other. The Board could decide not to increase the fee or could adopt an increase of \$3 or less. However, if the Board chose this option, the Board would run out of funding as early as the next fiscal year.

## **Effective date of increase**

The increase, if adopted, would go into effect on July 1, 2008.

#### Dear Ms. Emans:

Thank you for taking time to submit comments to the Board. Several teachers from Amphitheater have expressed similar concerns about the effect of the increase on them financially. I will be sure to pass your comments on to the Board.

I wanted to respond to some of the questions you asked.

- There is a newly created identity-verified fingerprint clearance card. With this card, a career teacher generally
  would not have to renew the card, at least not as often as the regular fingerprint clearance card. I would
  recommend that you consider that card as an alternative that would allow you to avoid renewing every six
  years.
- You asked why it's necessary to get a new fingerprint clearance card. The reason is that the Board of Education wants to find out whether there have been new arrests outside of Arizona. If a teacher with a card were arrested in Arizona, and the charge was for one of the crimes that would cause a card to be denied or suspended, then the card would be suspended. But if the crime occurs outside of Arizona—for instance, if the teacher committed assault in Las Vegas—the Board of Education wouldn't find out about it. Renewing periodically allows us to learn about any new arrests that occurred outside of Arizona.
- The six-year period of validity for fingerprint clearance cards is true both for paid employees, such as teachers, and volunteers. A volunteer also would have to renew the card every six years. However, if the volunteer has a current, valid fingerprint clearance card, he or she would not need to get a new one if the volunteer worked at another location. The same is true for paid employees: the card is good for any program that requires a fingerprint clearance card.

Again, thank you for taking time to write. It's important to the Board that it have a sense of the impact of a fee increase on citizens.

Mr. Seavers,

Let me make this brief. I do not agree with the \$5 increase in the cost of fingerprint clearance cards. We, as teachers, have to pay so much already. We have to pay \$60 for our preliminary teaching certificate. We are required to have areas in which we are highly qualified and each content area costs us an addition \$60. This is not including the costs of assessments (at least \$100 for each test) we need for each area. I have spent at least \$300 in the last 2 years just to be able to teach. When I got married I had to change my name and pay all this again so I could have my information put in my married name. I also had to pay for a new fingerprint clearance card. I almost went bankrupt from just completed the basic requirements and paying for them. Please, consider the teachers that have to pay for all the necessities in our classrooms, for activities, and the costs we pay just to teach. What will be left for us and our families to survive if you keep raising the costs for us to do our jobs?

#### Greetings:

Although there is a process for suspending fingerprint clearance cards based on new Arizona arrests, there is not a similar program for suspending cards based on new arrests outside of Arizona. The FBI doesn't keep the fingerprint data on file, so we don't learn about arrests that happen outside of the state. The purpose of renewing the card every six years is to find out whether there have been new arrests outside of the state.

There is a new identity-verified fingerprint clearance card that allows teachers, in many cases, to get one fingerprint clearance card without having to renew. That might save you the trouble of having to renew the card every six years.

Dear Mr. Burroughs:

Thank you for taking the time to submit comments as the director of a home health agency on the proposed fee increase. I also appreciate you pointing out the discrepancies between the notice of proposed rulemaking and the Board's Web site.

The Board's Web site is correct, and the notice of proposed rulemaking is wrong. I apologize for the error. The proposed increase would be from \$47 to \$52 for paid employees and \$43 to \$48 for volunteers. The error I made in the notice was that I calculated an \$8 increase, when we actually are proposing a \$5 increase that would bring the total to \$8. After the period for commenting on the increase, the Board may instead go with a \$4 increase, in which case the cost of a card would increase from \$47 to \$51 for paid employees and \$43 to \$47 for volunteers.

You also asked about the remainder of the fingerprint-clearance-card fee that doesn't go to the Board of Fingerprinting. Currently, the cost of a paid-employee card is \$47. Of that, \$3 goes to the Board, \$19 goes to the FBI, and \$25 goes to DPS. None of the money goes into the general fund (unless the Legislature sweeps non-appropriated funds).

I will pass on your comments to the Board. I will also pass them to DPS to consider the idea of categories of cards that have various fees. However, if you want an official response from DPS, you may want to write to the DPS Director's Office.

Please let me know if there are other comments or questions you have. Please also feel free to share this e-mail with any interested stakeholders.

Mr Seavers -

I would like to comment on the proposed increase in Fingerprint Card fees, to be effective July 1, 2008. While I am currently President of the Board of Directors of the Arizona Association for Home Care, I am not speaking for the Board or AAHC, rather commenting only as the Director of a licensed Home Health Agency.

First, I must convey my concern that the posting on the Fingerprint Board website (linked in your note below) indicates the increase will bring the cost for paid employee cards from \$47 to \$52, while the attached "Notice of Proposed Exempt Rulemaking", which I take to be the official document, states the rates "will increase to \$55.00 from \$47.00 for paid

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employees (including teacher certification) and to \$48.00 from \$43.00 for volunteers." The Notice's stated increase to \$55 not only differs from the website posting, but also seems inconsistent with amount of the volunteer fee increase in the Notice itself. I would like to have this clarified.

As a licensed home health agency, our homecare staff are required by our state licensure regulation to undergo fingerprint verification. We choose to pay the fingerprint card fee if the individual does not already have an appropriate card on file. As a relatively small agency with low staff turnover, a \$5.00 increase would not pose an unacceptable financial burden on our agency; larger agencies and individual caregivers may well have a different view of this. Frankly, while I understand why your department seeks an increase in its (small) portion of the total fee, I do wonder what happens to the remaining \$44 (or \$47) dollars we pay. I assume this goes into the state's general revenue fund, but I would be interested in an official explanation.

Our Association has supported the concept of some form of regulation of non-medical homecare providers ("private duty" caregivers), potentially including fingerprint verification, to protect the most vulnerable members of our society, the aged and infirm. At present these caregivers and their employers are *not* required to be fingerprinted, and there are known instances of these "caregivers" having significant criminal records that would preclude them from working in a licensed agency. We believe the lack of adequate regulation poses a serious risk to the public.

I am therefore concerned that, if there is no more reasonably priced category for fingerprint cards for these <u>non-medical providers</u>, who typically are paid near-minimum wage, having only the option of imposing a \$52 or \$55 fee will *reduce the likelihood that the legislature will pass a fingerprint requirement for this industry*. Clearly, the issue here is not actually the \$5 increase you wish to establish for your department, but the much greater amount that goes elsewhere within the state's bureaucracy. I would strongly advocate for an *increase in the number of categories for fingerprint cards, starting at a much lower total fee, in order to encourage this mechanism for protection of the public.* Perhaps this could be scaled for companies based on the number of employees, and for individual rates based on the individual's profession and relative rate of pay. The top end of this range would be the currently proposed amount.

I appreciate the opportunity to comment on this proposed increase, and look forward to clarification of the issues I have raised.

Thank you for your comments, which do make sense. I will be sure to pass them on to the Board.

I may be able to answer a couple of the questions you raise. The fingerprint-clearance-card fee is split among three agencies: the Board, which currently receives \$3; the FBI, which receives about \$19; and DPS receives about \$25. Last year, the FBI, not the Board, reduced its portion of the fee to \$19 from \$24, and that's why there was the decrease in the fingerprint-clearance-card fee.

Also, you suggested that the new staff members should have been accounted for in the budget. I may have misunderstood you, but you may be referring to Legislative appropriations. The Board receives no money from the Legislature. In April 2007, when the Board approved expenditures for additional staff members and related expenses, it was aware that it would have to raise its portion of the fingerprint-clearance-card fee as a result. The Board could have done it at that time, but other problems would have arisen. In particular, the Board had a fund balance of \$501,881.84 as of March 31, 2007. Legislators (and others) quite understandably are bothered when agencies with proportionally large fund balances raise fees. They wonder why the agency is raising the fee when it appears to be unnecessary at that time, even if the agency is raising it to deal with projections of future low balances. I fully agree with this concern. The Board determined that it would be best to raise the fee at a later date when it was necessary. That's why we're doing it now rather than at the beginning of this fiscal year.



**SUBJECT:** Status report on legislation



I have written separate memos on House Bill ("HB") 2254, which makes substantial changes to the Board's operations, and HB 2727, which makes substantial changes to the fingerprint-clearance-card system. I will send you the memo on HB 2727 at a later date.

#### HB 2194 (military facility; reservations, security)

Through a strike-everything amendment, this bill became a vehicle for legislation to add Department of Emergency and Military Affairs employees to the fingerprint-clearance-card system. The impact to the Board's caseload would be negligible.

Currently, the Board has cleared all Senate committees but Rules, where it has not been placed on an agenda.

#### HB 2566 (schools; student teachers, tutors; fingerprinting)

This bill adds student teachers and tutors to the fingerprint-clearance-card system. The Board of Education does not anticipate a large number of new fingerprint-clearance-card applications because many student teachers and tutors already have fingerprint clearance cards. Nonetheless, the bill will increase the number of good-cause-exception applications.

The bill was signed into law by the governor on April 28; since the bill contained an emergency clause, it became effective that day.

#### HB 2620 (budget adjustments; fiscal year 2007-2008)

This legislation was the "budget-fix" bill. It reduced state-government appropriations and swept funds to address the budget deficit for the current fiscal year. The Board of Fingerprinting Fund was not affected by the bill.



#### **HB 2640**

This bill would have included board and commission members among those defined as a "public officer" who must file financial-disclosure statements with the Secretary of State's Office. The Board wanted the bill to be amended to keep Board members' home addresses and household members from becoming public record, since the Board deals with individuals who have criminal histories.

The bill failed in the Senate Committee on Government.

#### Senate Bill 1477 (adult students; JTEDs)

This bill allows adult students to attend vocation programs in Joint Technological Education Districts if they have a fingerprint clearance card. This bill became relevant to the Board only recently, when the fingerprint-clearance-card provision was added through a strike-everything amendment. It is not clear what the impact of the bill will be on the Board's caseload; however, I assume that the impact will be minimal.

The bill is awaiting a floor vote in the House, after which it will be returned to Senate for consideration.

This memo summarizes the Board's fiscal year 2008 budget performance through the third quarter, which ended on March 31, 2008. The attached document provides detailed information on Board expenditures and revenues.

#### **Expenditures**

The Board budgeted for \$434,672.38 in expenditures through the third quarter. The Board actually spent \$432,049.98, yielding a savings of \$2,622.40.

Since the Board is unable to fill a vacant position, it can expect additional savings in the next quarter.

#### Revenues

As discussed at the February 8, 2008 Board meeting, revenues are lower than anticipated because of a drop in the number of fingerprint-clearance-card applications. The Board anticipated \$230,696.00 in revenues but actually received only \$185,777.00. Thus, the Board received \$44,919.00 less in revenues than anticipated in the budget.

#### **Board of Fingerprinting Fund balance**

The Board of Fingerprinting fund balance as of March 31, 2008, was \$223,958.66. The Board's budget anticipated a fund balance of \$266,255.26. Thus, the Board's fund balance was \$42,296.60 less than expected.
